

The Open Science North Consortium: Multi-Institution Final Year Project with Psychology Students

The North Consortium is a collaborative Final Year Project with psychology students and supervisors from Leeds Beckett University, Manchester Metropolitan University, and the University of Sheffield. Modelled on the GW4 Psychology Consortium (Button et al., 2019), this project allowed students across the different institutions to collaborate on project design, execution, and data collection under the guide of the team of supervisors. Students are currently writing up their dissertations individually, all having their own 'angle' on the overarching project (e.g., a moderator of main effects). As all students collected data on the same variables, the final output is a well-designed, high-powered dataset with potential for publication. This project has allowed students to experience first-hand how 'real-life' collaborative research is carried out.

The North Consortium is tied to the PsyCen Open Research and Scholarship Network, and the students have engaged with Open Science principles throughout the project, i.e., pre-registering the project and sharing their data. Sophie Harmon, the 21-22 consortium student from Leeds Beckett described her participation in the project as follows: "The Consortium has taught me so

much about real-world research and how to work with others. It has given me a lot more confidence when it comes to conveying my own ideas and the staff are brilliant and so supportive.



External Funding News

Dr Lisa Harkry and team were awarded funding from Wellcome Trust's 2021 Workplace Mental Health Commission for a project which aims to help employers improve the mental health of autistic adults in the workplace.

The focus of the project, one of only three projects to receive this funding in the UK, is on the effective use of supported employment methods to improve autistic adults' mental health. The Leeds Beckett University team includes **Dr Trish Holch, Dr Suzie Wang** and **Jessica Mayes.**

The project will result in a practical report for business leaders and policymakers to improve the mental health of autistic adults in the workplace. A showcase event will also be held at Leeds Beckett University later in 2022 to share the research findings, which will be represented visually by an autistic artist. Read more here



<u>Dr Tamara Turner-Moore</u> and team have been awarded funding by the Economic and Social Research Council (ESRC) for a four year project to explore interpersonal relationships, power and abuses of power within online sperm donation. The project involves a multi-disciplinary team of 10 people, including five national co-investigators across five UK institutions, one international co-investigator, and three research staff. At Leeds Beckett University, this includes <u>Professor Georgina Jones</u>, <u>Dr Lauren Smith</u>, Francesca Taylor and Georgina Forshall.

It is anticipated that the research will increase understanding of three important areas in our society: violence, health, and the internet. For violence, it will raise awareness of how women looking for sperm online (and, possibly, other people, too) are being abused, what support they need, and how we can stop this abuse from happening. For health, it will help inform decisions about whether NHS clinics should have more funding for sperm donation and who can access it, and whether the government should regulate online sperm donation. For the internet, it will help inform discussions about how the internet affects our lives and what safety and support we need online. In addition,

through action research workshops, the team will work with people involved in online sperm donation to bring about personal, professional and social change.



Let's Get to Know...

Dr Mirko Demasi

"My researcher focuses on the study of political discourse through the lens of discursive psychology. In particular I'm interested in how notions such as facts, rationality and truth are discursively constructed to argue for, and against, a particular ideological position. I have looked at political debates, particularly around the topic of the relationship between the UK and the EU, and I have also analysed instances of extreme prejudice, in instances of verbal face-to-face racist attacks. I am currently working on studying how British politicians, Boris Johnson in particular, talk about 'common sense' as a way to try and mobilise the British public to behave in a responsible and appropriate manner to slow down the spread of the coronavirus. My other project is on looking at how people talk about toilets online. That is, how are issues such as gender, safety and public toilets discussed? Some preliminary findings suggest that common sense are used to shift public accountability away from politicians (common sense project), and how the category of 'female/woman' is used in flexible, diverse, ways to argue for and against transgender women and whether they should have access to public female toilets. These are collaborations with Dr Shani Burke (Teesside University) for both projects, and Dr Philippa Carr (UWE – Bristol) and John Somers (University of Westminster) on the toilet talk project. More recently I have developed an interest in, and I am currently working on studying the scientific method, and its philosophical underpinnings by viewing it as a form of rhetorical argument. That is, how can one use deductive and inductive arguments to rhetorically bolster the "real-ness" of a particular study or scientific method? My other area of interest is in looking at the language of war and peace, hoping to understand how elite politicians, in this case Russian ones, justify and account for actions that result in and are a part of war."
