Course Overview

Aims

The course provides a grounding in the use of interpersonal and counselling skills for students who may have little or no background in the subject area and might also be new to study in higher education. The course is designed to introduce students to a foundation of theory and practice of interpersonal and counselling skills. It aims to develop core skills in the practice of interpersonal and counselling skills and an understanding of ethical practice in the application of skills. Students are challenged to confront personal prejudices and to think about diversity and develop personal awareness in how they relate to others.

The course provides the theoretical and skills requirements necessary to join the Diploma HE Therapeutic Counselling course (the professional practitioner course accredited by the BACP) and students may view the Certificate HE as a stepping-stone to this. However, students who choose to complete the Certificate HE and pursue other career pathways, will be able to transfer skills and knowledge into the work place, enhancing employability prospects.

The specific course aims are to:

Year 1

- Introduce students to the expectations of engaging in learning and teaching in higher education at level 4.

- Introduce students to a foundation of theory and practice of interpersonal and counselling skills.
- Introduce students to the contemporary context of the delivery of counselling and psychotherapy.
- Develop professional self-awareness and competency in the practice of interpersonal skills and core counselling skills.

Year 2

- Explore and develop the use of interpersonal and counselling skills.
- Develop ethical awareness and a commitment to diversity and anti-oppressive practice in groups and with individuals.
- Build a theoretical underpinning.

Course Learning Outcomes

At the end of the course, students are able to:

- 1 Apply key theoretical relevant concepts to the practice of interpersonal and counselling skills.
- 2 Demonstrate the core interpersonal and counselling skills required for an emerging counsellor's effective practice.
- 3 Demonstrate awareness and skills of the reflective practitioner appropriate to the use of interpersonal and counselling skills.
- 4 Recognise the ethical issues involved in using interpersonal and counselling skills with clients.
- 5 Demonstrate an understanding of social and cultural difference and an appreciation of the different values, beliefs and attitudes of 'clients'.

Teaching and Learning Activities

In year one, learning and teaching activities are blended (face-to-face and online), and consist of lectures, seminars, tutorials and online/classroom group and individual activities. Students practise counselling skills in small groups in the communication suites. Students are orientated to the teaching and learning environment of higher education and introduced to academic expectations and are made aware of the teaching and learning support available.

In year two, students are taught alongside students on the PG Certificate Interpersonal and Counselling (level 7) course. Learning and teaching activities will sometimes be differentiated from the level 7 students to support the development of level 4 academic skills and provide guidance on assessments. The course team recognise the need to be student-centred and provide appropriate graded delivery.

A specific course identity is fostered through a group understanding and collaborative working culture developed through the learning experience. An inclusive environment is created in which students learn by sharing their own and their peers' experience through the development of critical reflection, dialogue and

debate. The group must agree a code of conduct that respects and values the individuals within it whilst taking responsibility for their own psychological safety. This is further enhanced through students developing the core conditions of empathy, congruence and unconditional positive regard as described by Carl Rogers.

Students have opportunities to continue to practise counselling skills in small groups in the communication suites and receive peer and tutor feedback, to build development and awareness of themselves in relation to others. Again, blended teaching and learning activities are used to build theoretical knowledge, self-awareness and a knowledge of ethics and professional counselling practice.
