Professional Body

The LLM course is not currently accredited by the CIArb. However, graduates of the LLM programme may still apply to the CIArb for membership but they may have to pay a nominal fee for consideration of their application as it is not a recognised programme of study.

Alternatively, if studying on the two-year programme, candidates may complete the first year of the MSc programme (completing all of the accredited modules) and then transfer to the LLM for the second year. If studying on the four-year programme, candidates may complete the first two years of the MSc programme (completing all of the accredited modules) and then transfer to the LLM for the third year.

Course Overview

Aims

The course intends to develop and provide the following learning aims:

- To provide an effective, coherent and intellectually challenging postgraduate education in construction law and dispute resolution;
- To enhance students' abilities in the identification and evaluation of appropriate decision making strategies;
- To develop research capability and cognitive skills which enable students to analyse problems in their professional context.

Course Learning Outcomes

At the end of the course, students will be able to:

1	Critically evaluate construction contract doctrines and drafting
2	Exhibit innovative practice and sound professional knowledge, skill and values in the arena of conflict management and dispute resolution
3	Professionally engage in effective means for the avoidance and resolution of construction disputes
4	Exercise a high level of skill and competence in the fields of an expert witness, construction lawyer, adjudicator, arbitrator and mediator providing professional judgement in areas of construction law, and the practice and procedure of dispute resolution relevant to the student's professional environment
5	Exercise sound professional judgement, critically evaluating the perspectives of other professionals and making a positive, informed contribution to matters outside their areas of expertise in the context of construction law and dispute resolution issues

Teaching and Learning Activities

Summary

The course is offered on a distance learning basis only. Lectures are pre-recorded, with supporting live tutorials delivered online via Microsoft Teams (which are recorded and made available to all students). This facility allows regular contact with teaching staff.

The course employs a Learning and Teaching Strategy which seeks to bring together knowledge, skills and understanding. These will enable students to become effective and critically aware in the identification and evaluation of appropriate decision-making strategies, and to develop research capability and cognitive skills necessary to analyse and resolve problems in their professional context. The acquisition of knowledge and skills is seen as progressive and cumulative as students gain capability and move towards greater independence.

The Dissertation module is managed through the usual online classes and then by assigning students to individual tutors to supervise the development of the Dissertation. The supervisor will undertake further individual tutorials and/or online meetings with the student.

Students are expected to undertake background reading each week, both to enhance knowledge and critical awareness and to inform class discussions during the online workshop sessions. The move to increasing levels of student independence is progressive through the course with students expected to demonstrate a substantial degree of initiative and self-reliance in the Dissertation module.

There are multiple opportunities for students to consider research papers across the entire programme. The online library contains numerous excellent databases including Lawtel, Westlaw and Lexis which give access to a number of high level research papers in this sphere of study. Students are also directed to the repositories of a number of learned societies including the Society of Construction Law, The Adjudication Society, and the Chartered Institute of Arbitrators. Finally the Course Director maintains her own repository of all past dissertations and research papers which have been submitted on this course since 1996 and are made available to students via the relevant VLEs.

The Dissertation module requires students as part of the formative assessment on that module to evaluate and critique previous Literature Reviews in order to develop an appreciation of the standards required of their own material.
