#### **Course Overview**

#### Aims

MA Fine Art at Leeds Beckett promotes multi-disciplinary experimental practices within a framework of critical and conceptual sophistication. As independent practitioners and thinkers, students develop technical and theoretical skills equipping them with the necessary attributes to respond to contemporary challenges in the field of art practice.

The course recognises the breadth of professional and research-led opportunities within the subject area. It supports a culture of discursive enquiry and debate in which students respect wider professional contexts and consider new solutions for disseminating and promoting their work.

Alongside individual work flexible collaborative projects stress the importance of negotiation, adaptability and resourcefulness providing an ecosystem of support for art-making and curatorial ambitions.

The course draws upon expertise from a dynamic team of staff and practitioners. The academic and learning support teams have a wealth of professional and educational experience. This diverse knowledge supports the breadth of possible practices, including painting, sculpture, print, installation, video, sound, VR/AR, performance, curating, and other evolving innovations.

At the end of the course, students will be able to demonstrate:

LO1	An extensive comprehension of applicable practical and theoretical skills in the development and resolution of work.
LO2	Self-sufficiency in managing a sustainable, transformative art practice.
LO3	Agility and resourcefulness in working collaboratively with peers in advanced academic and professional contexts.
LO4	Independent and collective critical thinking and making in articulating studio practice.
LO5	A critical awareness of current issues in contemporary art.
LO6	An informed judgement on the cultural and professional aspects of their work.

#### **Teaching and Learning Activities**

#### Summary

The course is taught through combinations of lectures, seminars, tutorials, supervised studio activities, projects and events. In addition to course-specific lectures, the School-wide Inside/Out lectures provide students with inspiring case studies and role models. Studios, workshops and other practical facilities such as theatre and performance spaces, screening facilities and recording studios provide an inspiring and stimulating environment for students' ambitions. Teaching activities are in person, and lectures and seminars are live.

The course structure develops students' individual art practices through three sequential components that initiate (7.1), develop (7.3) and synthesize (7.4) their art-making. Their study is supported by a research methodologies element (7.2), delivered through lectures and seminars, that helps students locate and contextualise their practice in the critical and social aspects of creative and discursive questioning. Module 7.2 is shared with students from other postgraduate programmes within the School, fostering a wider research community and encouraging critical dialogue and exchange with students from other associated creative disciplinary areas.

Throughout the course students are supported by individual and group tutorials, a collaborative studentled seminar programme of mutual interest groups and an evolving opportunity to exhibit work and exercise ideas through critically curated presentations of work during the year. Students record critical reflections on work and events in an online journal to help form an understanding of their intentions and progress.

Modules 7.1 Practice: Approach and 7.3 Practice: Continuity both culminate in a presentation of work which articulates students' critical understanding of their practice. The methods and skills explored in module 7.2 Research Methods are applied in the production of a draft critical study of 2000 words at the end of 7.3. This is then developed as part of module 7.4 Practice: Synthesis to become a substantial critical study of 5000 words that articulates students' research-led contextual concerns and reflections.
