Course Overview

Aims

The course is designed to provide opportunity for educators and education stakeholders to develop the knowledge and skills required to successfully and appropriately research, design and implement an ethically sound transformative artefact, product or system for education. Global events have forced educators to rethink their pedagogies, their approaches to teaching and learning, and the way that they support their learners and one another. This course aims to provide a vehicle for formalising such changes in a more research-focused, evidence-based manner. The course culminates with the production of a transformative capstone project, around the student's proposed and implemented artefact, product or system of education.

Course Learning Outcomes

At the end of the course, students will be able to:

1. Critically evaluate research designs;
2. Understand and critically reflect on educational research dilemmas in relation to particular context and use of the research methodologies;
3. Critically analyse the ideas of values, ethics and inclusion in the diverse context of education;
4. Select appropriate data collection methods to address research question or problems relevant to education in their locale;
5. Devise and sustain arguments through critically reflecting on theory, research, policy and practice.

Teaching and Learning Activities

Summary

Students are taught entirely online throughout this course; all materials for every module are pre-prepared and accessible in a structured manner through our Virtual Learning Environment. Every module is led by a subject specialist lecturer, and students also benefit from dedicated group leaders who support the subject specialist lecturer, and online tutors who provide bespoke technical and academic skills support. Every student is allocated an Academic Advisor for the duration of their course, who can support academically, and also signpost to the pastoral officers supporting the programme. Whilst the majority of modules are supported in this way, the culminative **Transformative capstone project** module is further supported by an individual project supervisor. Communities of practice are developed early in the course utilising digital collaborative tools, in order to support students and build collective opportunities for distance working. All modules consist of a mixture of guided learning via the VLE, and independent study which is supported by the array of academic staff highlighted above.

Assessment Balance and Scheduled Learning and Teaching Activities

The assessment balance and overall workload associated with this course are calculated from core modules and typical option module choices undertaken by students on the course. They have been reviewed and confirmed as representative by the Course Director but applicants should note that the specific option choices students make may influence both assessment and workload balance.

A standard module equates to 200 notional learning hours, which may be comprised of teaching, learning and assessment, any embedded placement activities and independent study. Modules may have more than one component of assessment.

Assessment

On this course students will be assessed by coursework and presentations. There is a **Transformative capstone project** module which will require the production of a dissertation of 20,000 -22,000 words plus supporting evidence.
