In the field below please give a brief outline of the project and what it entailed.

Dr Paul Thompson, Reader in Popular Music at Leeds Beckett University's Leeds School of Arts delivered a series of talks at institutions both in the UK and the USA to students who are exploring topics related to the Beatles, their creativity and record production. The Abbey Road Institute is a specialist music production school founded at the world-famous Abbey Road Studios where the Beatles recorded a significant amount of their work. They deliver a professional one-year Advanced Diploma in Music Production and Sound Engineering. The University of Liverpool launched MA The Beatles: Music Industry and Heritage in September 2021. The programme aims to reframe and extend contemporary discourse about the Beatles beyond the historical and musicological into a broader and more robust 21st-century context.





The interactive talks were designed to encourage students to take an alternative perspective on creativity and engage them in studying the work of the Beatles and their record production in a way that hasn't been done before. The talks were underpinned by research from Chapter 6 of Paul's book *Creativity in the Recording Studio: Alternative Takes* (2019), which explores the creative system of songwriting and the specific example of 'Strawberry Fields Forever' (1967), written by John Lennon and Paul McCartney. The goal of the project is to inspire students, cultivate knowledge-exchange networks and stimulate discussion and self-reflection.

The interactive talks lead students through over one hundred years of research into creativity with two Knowledge Exchange Outcomes. Firstly, for students to gain a greater understanding of creativity research more broadly and appreciate contemporary approaches to studying creative practice. Secondly, the interactive talks encourage students to take a fresh perspective on the musical practices of the Beatles, which in-turn, helps to encourage them to reflect on their own musical work and practices and employ these models for their own creativity and thinking.
